




What are causative verbs? They're used when someone makes another person do something.

For example: I had my hair cut (I didn't cut it myself, but I made someone else do it)



Types of Causative Verbs



There are two main types:

Have/ Get

something done

e.g., I had my car washed

Make

someone do something

e.g., The teacher made us write the essay

Furning a subject-verb-object sentence into the causative

1 Identify the Parts

Find the subject, verb, and object.

Example: The chef cooked the meal.

- Choose and Apply the Causative Verb
- Use "have," "get," or "make."

Structure:

- For "have/get": Subject + have/get + object + past participle.
- For "make": Subject + make + object + base verb.

Example: I had the meal cooked.


- Adjust for Tense and Add Details
 - Ensure the verb matches the tense.
 - Add any necessary details.

Example: I had the meal cooked by the chef yesterday.

Example 1: Get/Have

When you get or have something done, it means someone does it for you!

Example: "I got my room cleaned by my brother."






Example 2: Make

When you make someone do something, you're the boss!

Example: "My mom made me do my homework."


